Funds will pay for completion of this regionally supported range which, upon completion, will serve over four hundred local, state and federal law enforcement officers in the central Virginia area. Basic firearms training and mandatory in-service requirements will be provided at the facility, as will advanced firearms and comprehensive multi-agency scenario based training. The Albemarle Police Department is an equitable sharing member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.

The Albemarle Police Department is an equitable sharing member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Amherst County	\$ 46,539.00	Amherst will receive \$46,539 to upgrade 1st generation laptop computers in their patrol vehicles. This upgrade will further enhance their network and data security to allow them to remain in compliance with National Criminal Information Center and Virginia Criminal Information Network requirements. This project will also assist in increasing officer safety through rapid receipt of wanted information and security concerns of individuals. This does not create a windfall situation for the agency. Appomattox County Sheriff's Office	\$ 11,450.00	Appomattox will receive \$11,450 to provide four night vision units to be deployed to the field deputy supervisors and allow for night vision to be available on patrol at practically anytime. This will enhance officer and public safety and aid in the capture of criminal suspects. It will also enhance officer's abilities to gather information on criminal activity and help locate lost/missing children and adults. This does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Arlington Police Department	\$ 55,000.00	Arlington will use the \$55,000 to expand its current capability to deploy portable digital video cameras, used in combination with both wireless and wired networks, to enhance security at large scale events. The real time cameras will reduce security risks and in the event of an actual incident allow emergency managers greater situational awareness, thereby greatly improving command and control capabilities while recording events for later review and evidentiary purposes. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Ashland Police Department	\$ 151,681.16	The Town of Ashland Police Department will receive \$151,681.16 to establish a comprehensive Active Shooter response program for officers, mobile license plate reader for 2 vehicles, replace mechanical locks to the police station entry door security system, a total station digital evidence collection system to aid in investigation of accidents and major crime scenes, wireless signal booster for the police station to cover cell phones and laptops with weak signals and officer worn camera systems which will replace the out-of-warranty system we currently have. The Town of Ashland PD is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Augusta County Sheriff's Office	\$ 59,461.00	Augusta will receive \$59,461 to obtain Panasonic Toughbook Mobile Data Terminals, licensing and associated hardware to completely equip all of their Patrol Division vehicles with computers. These devices will provide officers with capabilities such as report and ticket writing and completing electronic data entry on all standard forms. It will also provide a vast array of information regarding dispatched calls and provide access to NCIC/VCIN and Virginia DMV files. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Bedford Sheriff's Office	\$ 503,648.00	The Bedford Sheriff's Office will receive \$503,648.00 to establish "Protect the Protectors" ballistic program by providing ballistics to law enforcement agencies that are unable to provide for their own officers. This will be a regional program available for all law enforcement within the Commonwealth. These will be used by SOVA ICAC and its 121 affiliates in Southern Virginia by providing training as well as a regional lab set up for undercover operations across the Commonwealth and finally these funds will be used for forensic light source equipment for investigations. They will also purchase an ICAC Rapid Response vehicle for use in search warrants and road response to child exploitation and abduction cases throughout the south west region of Virginia. The Bedford SO is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.

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Blacksburg Police Department	\$ 51,375.00	Blacksburg will receive \$51,375 for the purchase of an explosives detection canine with the proper schooling, equipment and computer software and a new SUV K-9 vehicle. With this vehicle and canine, they will be able to adequately respond to possible bomb threats and suspicious packages. Both would be used in critical situations as well as to conduct a wide variety of searches for large events, such as Virginia Tech football games, festivals, parades, races, etc. The funds will help increase efforts to keep the public safe and efforts to detect explosives. Buckingham County SO is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.

These vests are designed to protect the officers from the more high powered ammunitions that have been used in previous active shooter incidents. (60 protective vests for high-powered direct hit, PPE Level IV Triple Curve Ceramic Plate, breast plate and pouches). All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
City of Fairfax Police Department	\$ 591,000.00	Fairfax Police Department will receive \$591,000 to renovate their 30 year old in-door firearms training facility to ensure compliance with OSHA standards. This facility will also serve the City of Falls Church Police Department, Sheriff's Office and George Mason University Police Department through a partnership agreement. City of Fairfax Police Department is an Equitable Sharing Member and is in compliance. This funding does not create a windfall situation for their agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
City of Fredericksburg Police Department	\$ 251,025.00	Fredericksburg Police Department will receive \$251,025.00 to correct deficiencies in communications capability by enhancing radio communications by moving from analog to digital. The upgrade will provide additional radio channels, better communication security and the need to meet FCC mandates for more efficient use of bandwidth and ability to carry data for additional features and functionality. The City of Fredericksburg Police Department is an Equitable Sharing Member and is in compliance. This funding does not create a windfall situation for their agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
City of Manassas Park Police Department	\$ 153,617.00	The City of Manassas Park Police Dept will receive \$153,617 to create a tactical special Response Team (SRT) to respond to life threatening situations and purchase required equipment such as two police equipped Tahoe's, SWAT gear and training materials. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
City of Manassas Police Department	\$ 121,565.00	The City of Manassas Police Dept will receive \$121,565 to purchase a directional radar trailer to slow traffic and make roads safer to travel; five police bicycles and equipment to be used to patrol portions of the City where a vehicle has limited or no access; a mobile data forensic extraction device to allow specially trained officers to extract information from multiple types of mobile devices such as portable GPS units, smartphones and tablets; and a rapid response sports utility vehicle. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
City of Newport News Police Department	\$ 144,112.00	The City of Newport News Police Department will receive \$144,112 to various items of equipment (transmitters, transceiver, computers, body cameras, targets, night sites, handguns, blue guns, tasers, handguns) to fight crime and maintain operations and officer safety as well as the information technology infrastructure. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
City of Poquoson Police Department	\$ 90,569.00	The City of Poquoson Police Department will receive \$90,569 to purchase and completely outfit two marked patrol vehicles with needed equipment and to obtain a Cellebrite UFED machine and to train and certify two police officers in the proper use. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
City of Richmond Police Department	\$ 1,494,787.00	City of Richmond Police Department will receive \$1,494,787 for a Richmond Police Canine Training and Community Complex to replace the current inoperable facility and provide training, volunteer opportunities and continued community partnerships. They will also purchase updated tactical body armor for their SWAT Team for when they respond to high risks incidents, a Driving & Force on Force Simulator to be utilized at the training academy, and the Accreditation Management System (PowerDMS) used by Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies Inc. The City of Richmond Police is an Equitable Sharing Member and is in compliance. This funding does not create a windfall situation for their agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
City of Suffolk Police Department	\$ 80,320.00	The Suffolk Police Department will receive \$80,320 to outfit two SUV patrol supervisor vehicles with equipment to immediately respond to situations. They will also purchase a police dog trained in officer protection and drug detection and various equipment such as ballistic shields, LIDAR units, and electronic control devices. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.

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Clarke County Sheriff's Office	\$ 50,000.00	The Clarke County Sheriff's Office will receive \$50,000.00 to purchase 10 Motorola portable radios . The Clarke County Sheriff's Office is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Danville Police Department	\$ 169,593.00	The Danville Police Department will receive \$169,593.00 to go towards purchase of body worn cameras and collar mount, 3yr software usage of Evidence.com, storage on Evidence.com and shipping of body worn cameras. The Danville PD is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Dayton Police Department	\$ 129,602.00	Dayton Police Department will receive \$129,602.00 to purchase Law Enforcement equipment, specifically 1 Ford Taurus and 2 Ford Explores with safety/emergency equipment and installation to replace high mileage vehicles. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
DCJS	\$ 522,200.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$522,200 to implement a statewide, online and classroom, multi-tiered School Resource Officer and School Security Officer Training program over a 24-month period. These funds will address the training needs of newly hired SROs and SSOs acquired through funding provided by the General Assembly in the aftermath of the Sandy Hook tragedy. These funds will also provide for the development of course materials for both the basic and advanced curriculum courses for SROS and SSOs in online modules to facilitate future trainings in a more cost effective manner. DCJS	\$ 500,810.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$500,810 to enhance law enforcement efforts to reduce gangs through trainings and programs and implement a statewide gang reduction program based on the OJJDP's model for such. These funds will support activities focused on awareness, training, and technical assistance. The GRP training program will cover a 24-month period and include 40 different training opportunities and 8 community awareness days in targeted areas. Funds will also address the development, production, and dissemination of videos and public service announcements to offset gang involvement and highlight prevention and intervention resources. After school activities, re-entry programs, and apprenticeship services will also be provided. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
DCJS	\$ 667,000.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$667,000 to implement a statewide, threat assessment team training program over a 24-month period. These funds will assist in the development and dissemination of new model policies, protocols, and guidelines for public school threat assessment teams as mandated by the General Assembly in 2013. Through a two year implementation of front line personnel assigned to threat assessment teams, DCJS will produce 120 site specific trainings to train 2000 school threat assessment teams in the start and develop a train the trainer curriculum to address sustainability and turnover in the positions. Curriculum materials and manuals will also be produced and disseminated. This does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
DCJS	\$ 800,000.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$800,000 to replace the current statewide training records management system that has outlived its usefulness as an accurate repository of more than 34,000 individual records. This system is more than 15 years old and uses outdated technology resulting in frequent faulty law enforcement officer certification data. The new system will ensure DCJS can accurately monitor the proper training and testing of all state and local law enforcement personnel. This does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
DCJS	\$ 1,482,102.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$1,482,102 to implement statewide Active Shooter Response and Improvised Explosive Device (IEDs) Awareness training programs for more than 19,000 local and state law enforcement officers. The goal of these training programs is to train law enforcement personnel to effectively and safely respond to and deter criminal/terrorist acts. This does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
DCJS	\$ 147,611.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$147,611 to collaborate with the Virginia Crime Prevention Association (VCPA) to offer new school and campus specific training programs on crime prevention. These funds will support a new certified crime prevention campus program designed by DCJS, institute more Certified Emergency Response Teams (CERT) in campuses of higher education, and support the newly created School Safety Inspection Checklist required by law. DCJS will oversee the development and implementation of these programs with the VCPA. This does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.

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DCJS	\$ 351,833.00	The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) will receive \$351,833 to collaborate with the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police (VACP) to expand and improve trainings and conferences for police executives in localities, municipalities, and campuses to support a police executive certification program. These funds will support a New Chiefs/Deputy Chiefs training program, institute an Internal Affairs Investigator training program, and expand the inclusion of police chiefs in training and conferences designed to improve the professionalism of police executives throughout the Commonwealth. DCJS will oversee the development and implementation of these programs with the VACP. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Dickenson County Sheriff's Office	\$ 42,850.00	Dickenson County Sheriff's Office will receive \$42,850.00 to enhance the ability of the officers to do reports in the field and eventually could allow officers to have mobile cad in the car. The project would also provide necessary equipment for investigators to adequately process crime scenes and do presentation in court. Realizing officer safety is of upmost priority, the other equipment would allow officers to have another tool to help maintain their safety. (21 Tasers and holsters to enhance officer safety, 21 iPads to enhance productivity in the field. 4 Digital camera kits to process crime scenes and do presentations in court. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Dinwiddie County Sheriff's Office	\$ 265,000.00	The Dinwiddie County Sheriff's Office will receive \$265,000.00 to purchase mobile computers for use in the field to enhance time management and increase efficiency. The Dinwiddie County Sheriff's Office is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Dumfries Police Department	\$ 9,970.50	Dumfries Police Department will receive \$9,970.50 to purchase equipment and uniforms, and provide training, to implement a Bicycle Patrol Program for the Police Dept. Bicycle Patrol Program will be utilized for patrol duties, crime prevention, and community outreach. Emporia Police Department	\$ 23,488.40	Emporia Police Department will receive \$23,488.40 to enhance their capabilities of performing some traffic related duties in a more economical and efficient manner, we are requesting 1 Harley-Davidson FLHTP w/ABS Motorcycle fully equipped with Police Lights and Siren to include PA System. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Fairfax County Police Department	\$ 775,770.00	The Fairfax County Police Department will receive \$775,770.00 to purchase Nikon 18-300mm camera lens, interactive display system units, IT equipment for Major Crimes Division, Go-Bags for Patrol Bureau, IT Bureau eSummons Devices, Portable Robots for Bomb Squad and SWAT. The Fairfax County PD is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Fauquier County Sheriff's Office	\$ 36,124.70	Fauquier County Sheriff's Office will receive \$36,124.70 to assemble 50 active shooter bags, ballistic shields, and spare firearm magazines. This would avoid smudging, smearing over/under inking and criminal background check results would be available in hours vs. days. All purchases are for law enforcement purposes.
Franklin County Sheriff's Office	\$ 124,022.00	The Franklin County Sheriff's Office will receive \$124,022.00 to purchase a mobile data information system and fireproofing of sheriff's office in order to remove Asbestos and lab analysis report to prove removal. The Franklin County SO is an Equitable Sharing Member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Grayson County Sheriff's Office	\$ 106,956.00	The Grayson County Sheriff's Office will receive \$106,956.00 to purchase 2 four-wheeled drive vehicles, rifles, EOTech Holographic Site, Surefire weapons light, AR cases, universal Swift sling, ammunition, thermal imaging weapons, .308 rifles and equipment and a mobile data information system. Harrisonburg Police Department	\$ 169,827.00	Harrisonburg Police Dept. will receive \$169,827.00 for a Sentinel video system. This phone has six convert video cameras that can be controlled remotely from a Command Center. The phone also give a 500 degree view of the barricaded subject/hostage taker as well as hostages; also a Public Eye software program that will allow police face-to-face communication of a complex critical incident between first responders and incident command staff to see maps, share ground information, and remotely look at evidence in real time. Harrisonburg PD is an Equitable Sharing member in compliance and the transfer does not create a windfall situation for the agency. All purchases are for a law enforcement purpose.
Henrico County Police Dept.	\$ 553,811.06	Henrico County Police Department will receive \$553,811.06 for various equipment and upgrades, specifically IFAK active shooter bags, tourniquet, combat gauze, flight simulator, digital cameras, hand entry kits for tactical IED kit, laser and sight robot, packbot robot as back-up, SWAT M-4 rifle scope upgrades, LRAD system, multi-vue receiver, transmission and receiver kit, dual band transmitter, nano-transmitter, mini-blade antenna, mobile antenna and audio and telemetry receiver.
