
- 97% of respondents would recommend the park they visited to a friend

In 1925, the plight of the middle Class, or the "Common Man," was paramount as Harry Byrd and his campaign manager W. E. "Will" Carson campaigned across Virginia. After winning the election, Governor Byrd appointed Carson Chairman of the newlycreated Commission on Conservation and Development.


Chairman of Virginia's Conservation and Development Commission 1926-1934

Governor George Peery, 1934-1938

"Our new state park system has been built to serve the working man. The working man is entitled to more than a bare existence, and so it is the duty of government, either state or national, to help bring to him some of the pleasures the world has to offer. The state parks are for all people, and not only will they afford recreation for our own people, but will attract tourists from other states." "A movement of this kind is the answer to those who argue that we are going backward. There is no place for Communism, Nazism, or Fascism in this country; but there must be recreational opportunities available to the rich and poor alike. I believe these parks will contribute greatly to the national good as we go forward to the splendid destiny that awaits in the future."



Press Franklin Roosevek's establishment of the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1920 had lasting conservation impacts across the nation. Virginia japined this effort when Will Carono of the Virginia Conservation Commission convinced Roosevek to use the Civilian Conservation Corps to build a state park system. Virginia is distinguished at the oxly state in the nation to topen a system of state parks on one day. On June 15, 1936, the first as state parks—Durdhat, Scoshore (present day Fint Landing), Hungry Mother, Fairy Stone, Wostmoneland, and Statunton River State Parks—were opened. From these humble beginning, the commonwealth has developed over 35 diverse, awardivirging state parks. From seabloor to mountains,

take a journey across Virginia through a vast array of landscapes and untivided natural and cultural resources. A native Virginian, author Sharon B. Ewing is manager of the Southwest Virginia Museum Historical State Park, one of the park system's diverse efferings. She is a member of the Virginia Association of Museum and has served on various organization to preserve the commonwealthis history in Images of America. Virginia State Park, Ewing celebrates 75 years of the park system and beyond, sharing photogengba and stories of Virginia's treasures.

The Images of America series celebrates the history of neighborhoods, towns, and cities across the country. Using archival photographe, achi the presents the distinctive sorties from the past that shape the character of the community today. 


