

All But One SREB State Offers Prekindergarten Seats Equal to Number of Children from Families in Poverty



- Alabama and North Carolina meet 10
- Arkansas, Oklahoma and Tennessee meet nine
- Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana and South Carolina meet eight



Standards of High Quality

State-level Assessment Initiatives

How do you know if your Pre-K programs are effective and if your children are ready for school?

- Maryland Model of School Readiness
- Texas Ready

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State Investment

- Increases in funding in all SREB states
- Variability in sources of state funding
- Not all had increases in per child spending
- Creative use of all federal funds for early care and learning

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Spotlight on the Leaders

- Oklahoma
 - 70 percent of 4's in state-funded programs
 - Nine NIEER standards
 - 97 percent of national average in per child spending
- Georgia
 - 51 percent of 4's in state-funded programs
 - Eight NIEER standards
 - 114 percent of national average in per child spending
- North Carolina
 - 21 percent of 4's in state-funded programs
 - Ten NIEER standards
 - 112 percent of national average in per child spending



Spotlight on the Leaders

- Oklahoma
 - Partner with private providers through public schools
 - Use state standards
 - Coordinate state Pre-K with Head Start
- Georgia
 - Created state agency for all birth-to-five programs
 - Contract with private providers

North Carolina

- Created Smart Start to serve children birth to five
- Linked state Pre-K More at Four to Smart Start
- State and local partnership

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- Availability of full-day and yearlong programs

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Challenges

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- Highly trained prekindergarten teachers

- Statewide coordination of all early learning programs and services
- Funding streams that are stable and adequate
- Aligned systems of assessments
- Availability of full-day and yearlong programs
- Access for 3-year olds from impoverished families, as funding becomes available.

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
