Governor Youngkin's Right Help, Right Now Plan




- 1. Ensure same-day care for individuals experiencing behavioral health crises
- 2. Relieve law enforcement's burden and reduce the criminalization of mental health
- 3. Develop more capacity throughout the system, going beyond hospitals, especially community-based services
- 4. Provide targeted support for substance use disorder and efforts to prevent overdose
- 5. Make the behavioral health workforce a priority, particularly in underserved communities
- 6. Identify service innovations and best practices in precrisis prevention services, crisis care, post-crisis recovery and support and develop tangible and achievable means to close capacity gaps

Provide funding for special conservators of the peace (SCOPs) at private hospitals – Authorizes DBHDS to provide funding to private hospitals for special conservators of the peace to relieve law enforcement from maintaining custody during a period of emergency custody or temporary detention.	\$0	\$35,214,906
Funds Adult Psychiatric Access Line – Provides funds for DBHDS to contract with Medical Society of Virginia to maintain the Adult Psychiatric Access Line.	\$0	\$1,534,100

Behavioral Health, Community, DOJ Settlement Agreement, and Capacity



Last Session, The Governor included in his budget \$300M to eliminate the Priority 1 waitlist.

The final budget included a phased approach to add 3,440 slots and provide a 3% rate increase each year of the biennium.

These two proposed amendments for the 2025 Session increase efficiencies in the allocation and administration of these slots.





According to the National Association for Regulatory Administration (NARA), the **national average caseload is <u>88</u> locations** per licensing specialist. In Pennsylvania, the caseload may be as much as <u>120</u> per specialist.

In Virginia, each licensing specialist has an average caseload of <u>339</u> locations.





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Title

Amends requirement language for Recovery Residences – Removes specific entities from being named explicitly in appropriation language and states that DBHDS may make grants to recovery residences certified by DBHDS for recovery support services.

Provide flexibility in school-based mental health program to support dual model service delivery – Allows funds provided for school-based mental health services to be used to make grants available to school divisions in addition to the current language directing DBHDS to contract with Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) to establish school-based clinics to provide mental health and primary health care.

Amends language for SCOPs – Adds flexibility to DBHDS to contract with private hospitals or other qualified agencies to hire SCOPs, as defined by code, to provide capacity for emergency departments to maintain custody of individuals under emergency custody orders and/or temporary detention orders until the individual is ready for transport to the bed of temporary detention or released. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, such contracts shall be exempt from competition as otherwise required by the Virginia Public Procurement Act.
